Niva Kegode (Shosho)

As I write this, it is pouring down rain...another blessing because it has been so hot and dry lately and I am ready to trade it in for some ice, cold, and snow. Let me share with you the story of a young man, Peter Maina, who used to live on the streets of Nakuru and has been an inspiration to me for a while now. Peter is about six feet tall, has remarkably huge hands, and always has a story to tell anyone who can listen. He is extremely industrious and will work at literally anything. He unloads trucks, carries 90 kilograms (200 pounds) on his back and when you think he is tired and ready to quit he asks for more work. When people are going home after working, he is sorting through trash choosing particular plastics that are used for recycling in the industrial area in Nakuru town.

Peter does all these things to support his family (he has a wife and child), his brother who is in school, and a child fathered by a relative who died during the 2008 post-election violence here in Nakuru. They live in the slums in Bondeni- a suburb of Nakuru town. Peter has been taught how to read so that he can get around. He only made it to standard five (5th grade). His wife did not go to school. He wants his brother to go all the way to university. We pray that he does and we support them in every way possible because, this is the ultimate plan...to get the street children and adults off the street and able to take care of themselves, their families, and

others while being full of self esteem and proud to be children of God.
